





- 154% increase in international students in Canada 2010-2018

- Top Programs: Wireless Information Networking, Project Management, Global Business Management, International Business Management



PETERBOROUGH'S INTERNATIONAL STUDENT POPULATION

Trent University – 1,175 international students

- Students from 85 different countries
- ESL, Undergraduate, Masters, PhD, Post-Grad Certificates
- Top Countries: China, India, Nigeria, Bangladesh, Vietnam
- Top Programs: Business Administration, Computing and Information Systems, Masters of Management, Data Analytics, Environmental Science



Economic Contributions of International Students

International student contributed approximately \$114 + million dollars to the Peterborough economy in 2018.

AFTER GRADUATION...

- International students love Peterborough and want to stay, but it is difficult to find employment.
- They often need to leave Peterborough to get the work experience necessary for permanent residency.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS ARE...

- committed workers (incentivized to stay)
- global citizens with diverse perspectives
- highly-educated
- skilled and knowledgeable (languages, access to new markets)
- a new, largely untapped resource for the Peterborough community



Why are some employers hesitant to hire international students?

Uncertainty about legality of hiring int'l students

Impression that international students will leave Ptbo/Canada after graduation

Concern about a student's unfamiliarity with local market



International Students: Off-Campus Working Eligibility

During the academic year:

20 hrs/week

During Scheduled Breaks (summer and holiday closure):

Unlimited hours

Who is eligible:

Degree or certificate-seeking students.

SP conditions will note eligibility to work on off-campus

Student will have a SIN

Who is not eligible:

Primary or Secondary students, ESL, short-term students w/o a study permit



International Students: Post-Graduation Working Eligibility

Must change temporary resident status from "student" to "worker"

Trent and Fleming Immigration Advisors can help

Must obtain a Post-Graduation Work Permit (PGWP), or jobspecific Work Permit



Post-Graduation Work Permits

- Valid for length of academic program, max 3 years
- Typically valid for 3 years for University grads and 2 years for College grads
- Open Work Permit valid for any job, anywhere in Canada
- PGWP holder will have a SIN, typically valid for duration of PGWP
- Same rights and responsibilities as any employee



Pathways to Permanent Residence

- International Students are Canada's #1 ideal demographic for immigration: educated, acculturated, economically stable.
- 60%+ want to immigrate to Canada post-graduation
- Many others want Canadian work experience before returning home
- These factors = dedicated, skilled workers

Pathways to Permanent Residence

Express Entry Program is a federal program which expedites Permanent Residence (PR) eligibility for qualified applicants (6 month max processing times)

Points are allocated based on specific criteria (education, language skills, family-ties, and qualifying work experience)



Pathways to Permanent Residence

1560 hours of qualifying work required

NOC is a federal system to classify occupations based on work duties

Qualifying work experience = National Occupational Classification (NOC) Level 0, A, or B (skilled jobs)

0 = managerial

A= professional

B= skilled trades
