

Living in Peterborough for close to two years, Abdulhamid has attended ESL classes and the LINC program at Fleming. He also attended the Workplace Hazardous Materials Information System (WHMIS) training delivered at the New Canadians

Centre to prepare him for employment.

"I worked in construction for most of my life in Syria. To be able to do this kind of work here in Peterborough, makes me and my family, very happy," says Abdulhamid. "We are very grateful to Canadians for their kindness. We want to give back to them for all they have done for us."

Khidir Had to Leave School Because of the War. Because of You, He's Studying to be an Accountant at Fleming College

Life changed for 24-year-old Khidir Bkdach when he started volunteering at the New Canadians Centre. "One day, Khidir walked into my office and told me he wanted to improve his English," explains

employ his skills as an interpreter. He started volunteering his time – for doctor's appointments and training sessions. "When a client came to the NCC with a problem, Khidir was there to help."

"One day, Jack called me and said there was an emergency and I had to go to the hospital with him," Khidir remembers. A new family was arriving from Syria and they were in need of urgent medical attention. "Khidir was right there with the doctor

in the emergency room explaining everything," Jack says. Not long after, Khidir, who grew up and attended school in Homs before the war broke out, started working at the NCC as a summer student. "I couldn't finish school because of the war. I studied at home and I watched movies to keep learning English." His favorite? "The Godfather."

he says with a smile. "I identify with this family because they had to work so hard. They wanted so much to belong in their new country."

32-year-old Ahmad Lalou knows the importance of living in a welcoming community.

Currently enrolled in the English as a Second Language Bridge program at Fleming College, Ahmad started working towards the goal of becoming an Industrial Electrician when he was in high school in Syria – before the war broke out.
