



As a core service, we aim to support newcomers to Canada at various stages of their journey with services that meet their immediate and basic needs. As the pandemic rages on, we have noticed greater volumes of clients struggling to meet their needs, particularly as a result of not being eligible for financial assistance and job loss from pandemic layoffs. More emphasis was placed on helping clients navigate systems, apply for emergency supports, and referrals to other agencies.

As in the past two years, there remains a high need for support with citizenship. We continued to offer infosessions on the process and eligibility, one-to-one support with application and test-taking, and Test Preparation courses. As needed, we have also provided clients with space and technology to take their test and their oaths at the NCC offices. It is a joy to celebrate a client receiving their citizenship.

With the crisis in Afghanistan in 2021 and the evolving crisis in Ukraine, our team played and continues to play a vital role in supporting families already in Canada who would like to sponsor their families as well as Ukrainians arriving in Canada and settling in Peterborough and Northumberland as Temporary Residents.

In addition to day-to-day client interactions, we continued to provide workshops, activities, and programs in response to client needs. These included:

- 85 Language Assessments to facilitate referral to government-funded language learning programs.
- II Information Sessions on topics including Canadian Citizenship, Fake News & Misinformation, Levels of Government, PR Pathways, and Credit Scores.
- Citizenship Test Study & Preparation Courses attended by 26 clients.
- Tax Clinics helped 105 clients file their income taxes.

The Mustafa family arrived in Canada in November 2016 as Government-Assisted Refugees and

have shown great resolve and determination to succeed in Canada. Keen to learn the language, work and continue schooling, the parents began English classes through LINC at Fleming College while their two sons went to Thomas A. Stewart Secondary School. Within their first few months, Ali, the father, was employed at Trans Canada Nissan. In 2019, Ali and his sons Mohammad and Omar started a successful construction and maintenance business serving the Peterborough and GTA regions.

Throughout their time in Canada, the New Canadians Centre has supported the Mustafa family through their transitions. In their initial months, we helped them find housing, secure employment, access healthcare, enroll in school, and provided referrals for important services.

Most recently, the team at Settlement Services have supported the family in applying for Travel Documents and their Canadian Citizenship. Ali and Omar took the oath of citizenship in April and are proud to call themselves Canadian citizens.

The Unitarian Fellowship of Peterborough prepared and cosponsored with Mohammad his fiance's application for refugee status, and also helped Ali to apply to bring his daughter and family to Canada.

Now five and a half years in Canada, the Mustafa family has integrated quite well. They are independent and work hard to reach their goals and dreams each day. And we are there to cheer them on and support them each step of the way.

### 16-YEAR OLD SAMI EMBRACES LIFE'S CHALLENGES

When Sami El Moussa first came to Canada at the age of 10, he had no idea what his future would hold. He did not know what to expect, and with no English skills, the first two

years were challenging. He remembers how difficult it was to keep up with everything happening around him at school and within the community.

When asked what advice he would give his 10-year-old self now as a 16-year-old, he says, "I would tell myself to accept all the challenges that come my way, that if I work hard, it will make me a better person later on even if it's hard and seems impossible now."

Sami indeed accepted all the challenges of being a newcomer to Canada. He began volunteering at St. James Church as a camp counsellor for kids and enjoyed being a leader. This motivated him to join the first cohort of the New Canadians Centre's Young Leaders Council (NCCYL) in 2020. Sami participated in meaningful discussions with other newcomer youth and worked on projects to help newcomer youth settle in Canada, such as the NCCYL guidebook.

"I really enjoyed my time on NCCYL. I wanted to challenge myself further, and I like to be a leader. It was great to gain leadership experience on the council, and I really learned that teamwork makes the dream work - I was able to learn from my teammates on the council and learn to have discussions with people with different perspectives."

Sami currently works at the YMCA, running programs for children, including creative arts, science, and sports. He is very grateful for the support he received from NCC to continue to accept and grow from the challenges that life throws at him. It has been a privilege to watch Sami grow into the outstanding community member he is today.

Spring 2021 brought many opportunities to meet in person again in outdoor spaces. This drew in many newcomer youth who attended our summer drop-ins at Millennium Park, where they were able to meet with staff, participate in activities, and enjoy treats. When public health guidelines allowed for in-person activities again, we transitioned our After-School Club to the Downtown Youth Space at PACE in the fall. The fall also saw the Settlement Workers in School (SWIS) team returning to schools to meet with students and teachers following over one and a half years of not being physically present in schools due to pandemic measures. This opened up many opportunities to connect with students, promote programming, and address their pressing needs.

This year, a strong focus was placed on career planning for newcomer youth, recognising the importance of making this information available early on. Youth met with our Skills Development Specialist for career coaching at the After-School Club and other times. Many youth utilised this service for help to reflect on their skills and interests and receive support in applying for jobs. In March, we facilitated the Youth Explore Camp, a five-day interactive career exploration program attended by 25 newcomer youth.

Several other programs also grew this year, including:

- Expanded partnership with Peterborough Youth Services and launching the New Canadian Youth Outreach Worker staff position hosted at PYS, which has increased capacity at both organisations leading to positive outcomes for clients
- Another cohort of the New Canadians Centre Young Leaders (NCCYL) Leadership Council comprising seven youth
- Family Literacy in Peterborough (FLiP) program supported five families comprising almost 30 individuals with literacy learning and social connections
- Online Pre-School Program led by Early Childhood Educators for newcomers with pre-school aged children

The goal of the Workplace Integration program is to help newcomers join the workforce by providing job search support and coaching and organising skills development and job preparedness training. We also work closely with local employers to help fill their labour gaps and enhance their capacity to work with newcomers.

The team continued to support newcomers with diverse work and educational backgrounds by:

- Providing newcomers with important information on the Canadian Labour Market and supporting their employment planning through resume and cover letter critiques, job leads, and connections with employers
- Offering newcomers opportunities to obtain First Aid certification and to undergo WHMIS training in Arabic
- Partnering with PACE to deliver computer literacy training to English language learners
- Organising sewing skills training when we were able to gather in person in the fall
- Delivering workshops where newcomers learned their rights as employees and about Canadian workplace culture.

Staff also delivered the inaugural Home-Based Business Incubator (HOBBI) and Youth Explore Programs to support skills building and career exploration for newcomer women and youth.

Through outreach to committed business owners and employers, staff established the Workplace Integration Advisory Group. This provides a valuable exchange of information and feedback on labour force needs and resources for staff recruitment and retention.

#### "NOTHING IS TOO HARD TO START."

These words shared by Bahar Akbari exemplify the optimism and motivation shared by the newcomer women who participated in the Home-Based Business Incubator (HOBBI) program. The 10-week skills training program, funded by the federal Gender Equality Fund through the Community Foundation of Greater Peterborough, aimed to provide aspiring newcomer women entrepreneurs with the tools, knowledge, skills, and confidence to launch their own home businesses.

The women participated in 20 dynamic workshops over 10 weeks on various topics and built connections with industry experts who visited the sessions as guest speakers and panellists.

"HOBBI opened my horizons. I learned a lot about how to effectively deal with stress, how to plan my day and keep up with everything, how to concentrate on the essentials and find like-minded people and business partners. It's amazing how many interesting and successful people have gathered here to share their experiences of building their own businesses. Thank you so much from the bottom of my heart!" says Olena Oliinyk.

As the program progressed, inner strength was found as the women became more vocal, engaged with presenters, and ultimately expanded their professional network. So, what did the women learn through the course of this program?

In the words of HOBBI participant Grace Terfa, "I am more equipped than I realise".

#### THIS IS WHAT HOPE LOOKS LIKE

In 2016, nine-year-old Amani (far right in photo) and her family came to Peterborough from Syria. Her youngest sister was born in the refugee camp a month earlier. Waiting for their parents at our office, the girls visited with staff to pass the time, and they started to sing:

"I am a child with something to say; please listen to me. I am a child who wants to play; why don't you let me?"

A young child sang this song "A'atuna Al Toufoule" (Give Us Childhood), during the Lebanese Civil War in the '80s.

There was a lot of uncertainty in those early days for the family. They were far from their loved ones and also navigating much that was unfamiliar: creating a new home, trying to find work, sorting out schooling for their children, learning English, and trying to heal from the instability that the war created.

The family accessed resources to meet their needs through the New Canadians Centre. Their caseworker supported them in accessing essential services and documents, and the youth services team ensured the children were enrolled in school and engaged in activities. The family was also assigned a volunteer support team who they continue to maintain friendships with.

Now in their fifth year of settlement in Canada, the family is thriving. Recently, Amani and her sisters were pleased to receive their Canadian citizenship. Amani is a happy and confident first-year student at high school. Her three sisters are well-settled at elementary school. Her father is proud to be part of the team at Chemong Home Hardware. And her mother is looking forward to opening her own hair salon one day.

Peterborough gave this family the hope they had been searching for five years ago. Now, they can call Canada home. Amani says, "I want to be a doctor or a nurse. I want to help others, and I want to protect people." This is the hope and potential that resettlement presents.

The year started as usual, with the team expecting to support up to 75 government-assisted refugees for the year based on our agreements with the federal government. As borders began to reopen, a steady flow of clients arrived as the government worked to clear the immigration and resettlement backlogs caused by the pandemic.

When news broke from Afghanistan, we stepped up and agreed to do our part to receive people fleeing an urgent situation, thereby increasing our expected client numbers. We brought in some former staff members to assist with the sudden influx of people and called on community volunteers to help. While the Afghan Resettlement Initiative was ongoing, we were still receiving our expected cohort of refugees from other countries. Due to the sudden increase of clients, we quickly worked to secure an additional temporary house to receive clients and increased our staffing complement. We also built new partnerships with local hotels and restaurants to provide accommodation and food. During these first few months, the Resettlement Assistance Program (RAP) Team worked with clients to secure permanent housing, apply for important services and documents, and address pressing needs like healthcare.

Once these immediate needs were met, the Case Management Team worked with clients to support their goal setting and navigating complex systems. We helped clients successfully apply for the Ontario Disability Support Program, find employment (with the support of the Workplace Integration Team), gain and develop various skills, apply for Canadian Citizenship, and facilitated connections with community partners for specialised needs and services as they emerged.

Since launching our Resettlement Program in 2016, the team has helped resettle 473 individuals from 113 families. We are pleased to play a part in the larger picture of refugee resettlement and support.

AFGHANS ARRIVED & SUPPORTED AFGHAN FAMILIES

AFGHAN INDIVIDUALS UNDER THE AGE OF 18

In early September, the NCC received a call from the federal government that approximately 75 Afghan refugees would be sent to Peterborough in four days. These families were part of the 2000 Afghan refugees who had arrived in Toronto in August and needed to move to other communities for resettlement services.

NCC was aware that we could be called upon to help with the Afghan Initiative but did not expect to have to leap into action so quickly. We immediately contacted Tamara Hoogerdyk and Jack Gillan, who were previously involved with NCC's resettlement program. They agreed to coordinate the Afghan initiative, and within 48 hours, a plan of action was created.

Hotel rooms were booked, and food, childcare and greeters were arranged. 33 Afghans were welcomed on September 17, with other families coming in the following days and weeks.

While most decided to relocate to other communities to be closer to family and friends, we assisted all families during their first few weeks. We provided orientation sessions on life in Canada, finance, education, and schooling. We helped them acquire essential documents, such as Social Insurance Numbers, registration for the Ontario Health Insurance Plan, and setting up of bank accounts. We also supported families in finding housing in Peterborough and assisted with out-of-town applications for housing.

The need to support Afghan families in their resettlement will continue in the coming months and years. With the support of our community, NCC will be able to offer these families what they need to have a safe future here in Canada.

## A CHANCE AT SAFETY AND SECURITY

Parwaiz Hamidy remembers the relief he felt when he landed in Toronto and knew that his family was safe for the first time in years. He recalls living each day watching over his shoulders as he tried to



protect his wife and two young sons. An interpreter for the Canadian and US armed forces in Afghanistan, Parwaiz had been waiting to relocate to Canada for over ten years. That process was sped up in August 2021 following the Taliban takeover. Parwaiz and his family arrived in Canada in late August and spent the first few weeks in a hotel in Toronto, awaiting their resettlement.

While in Afghanistan, they were introduced to a local volunteer in Peterborough who helped them get their paperwork and applications in order. Knowing that relocating to a new country would be challenging, the support of local volunteers would be instrumental for the family. Parwaiz is grateful to the volunteers who helped his family get to know the city and served as a vital source of connection, motivation, and comfort. The family's caseworkers at the New Canadians Centre helped them secure permanent housing, apply for essential documents and services, and ensure the children were enrolled in school. They were also able to secure a spot for Parwaiz's wife to attend English Language classes.

A trained and experienced lawyer in Afghanistan, Parwaiz faced a significant hurdle in Canada in securing employment as his education and experience are not recognised here. He looks forward to beginning studies in the trades in the fall with the hopes of securing gainful employment soon. He reflects that "life in Canada is different from life in Afghanistan and we have to start all over again. This will be very difficult for us, but we have to fight this problem and move on with our lives." For now, they are taking a moment to heal and get accustomed to life in Canada. And while it is devastating to be away from their home, they are grateful for the welcome Canadians have given them and the chance at safety and security.

Never has there been a greater need to offer ways for newcomers to connect than during this pandemic. It is a huge testament to the skills and dedication of our volunteers and our partner organisations in the community that we were able to offer our clients over 200 group activities. Most were held on Zoom including weekly English classes and conversation groups, a program of Welcome Inside virtual tours of local places of interest and another amazing Winter Celebration Party.

But the highlights of the year were the occasions when we could bring people together to meet in-person again - our new Move with NCC summer program in King Edward Park gave individuals and families the chance to try Taekwondo, Bollywood dance, Yoga and Zumba; and through our partnership with Camp Kawartha we offered clients the opportunity to go snowshoeing for the first time and to share the experience of venturing into the snowy forest to learn how maple syrup is produced. They also made and ate maple taffy. You can't get more Canadian than that!

Our programs and activities included:

- Weekly English Language Groups on Zoom attended by 70 newcomers
- Social Groups like the Women's Group & Summer Move With NCC Series attended by 63 newcomers
- Trips (virtual and in-person) to discover and engage in Canadian traditions, activities, and places of interest attended by 101 newcomers
- Annual Winter Celebration hosted virtually attended by 62 newcomers
- Language Groups (Spanish & French) attended by
   54 individuals (newcomers & community members)

NEWCOMERS ATTENDED ACTIVITIES PROGRAMS & ACTIVITIES

In Northumberland County, we continue to support newcomers with immigration & settlement needs, referrals for language and employment support, and social activities to help build connections and minimise social isolation caused by the pandemic.

The most pressing needs from clients in Northumberland included support with their citizenship applications, permanent resident card renewals, language assessments, and sponsorship application information. There is also a growing interest among newcomers in the county to start businesses, and we have helped refer them to our partners in the region for more specialised support.

Recognising the challenges and effects of pandemic measures, a need for more social connections was identified, leading to hiring an additional staff member in the Northumberland Office to increase our Community Connections offerings. 104 newcomers attended at least one of 15 activities hosted, building connections between families and re-engaging previous clients. Events have been



well attended, with 20 to 50 people attending each. These family-friendly events included pumpkin carving, pottery painting, gingerbread house making, swimming, taekwondo, and virtual bingo.

We are grateful for the support of our partners in the Northumberland area, including Northumberland County Settlement Services and our eager volunteers. Volunteers are the backbone of our organisation, and they have helped facilitate sessions for our Women's Group, helped with social events, and tutored newcomers in English.

### **VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR - NORTHUMBERLAND**







- Published "Building A Home" a children's book inspired by the stories of six newcomer children and written & illustrated by newcomer Casandra Lee
- Supported the ReFrame Film Festival screening & panel discussion on "The Cost of Freedom" documentary
- Organised the Canadian Multiculturalism Day Showcase on June 27
- Committed to reconciliation and education with a Day of Reflection themed "Lessons from the Land" on July I
- Organised two Newcomer Leadership Groups focused on building capacity in newcomers for civic engagement
- Collaborated with filmmaker Shahed Khaito on the short-documentary "The Hands That Feed Us" highlighting the experiences of migrant farm workers

## SPOTLIGHT ON NEWCOMER VOICES

Over the past year, a strong focus has been placed on amplifying the voices and perspectives of newcomers within the community through a variety of creative and innovative means. Several programs and projects were developed and expanded to provide opportunities for newcomers to tell their stories. A few of these are profiled below.



The LIVING LIBRARY is a multi-modal storytelling and public education program that aims to share human stories of immigration and integration by highlighting diverse and compelling stories of transition, settlement, and belonging. Newcomers are provided with training and coaching in storytelling and opportunities to share their stories through speaking engagements, podcasts, videos, and articles. This year, 7 newcomers shared their stories at 13 virtual and in-person speaking engagements to a total combined audience of 294 people. They were also featured in season 2 of the Living Library Radio-Podcast Series in partnership with Trent Radio. The 5-episode season has been streamed over 200 times.

BUILDING A HOME is a children's book commissioned by the New Canadians Centre and written and illustrated by Casandra Lee, a newcomer herself. "Building A Home" takes us on the journeys of six children from Syria, Kazakhstan, Mexico, and Pakistan who are now living, playing and going to school in Nogojiwanong-Peterborough. It is available in seven languages, and through a generous grant from the David Goyette & Victoria Pearce Arts Fund at the United Way of Peterborough and District, 490 free copies of the book have been distributed to NCC clients, community members, local organisations, the library, and each school in Peterborough.

**NEWCOMER STORYTELLING GROUPS** have provided hands on training and experiential opportunities in creative storytelling. A partnership with Trent Radio provided an opportunity for 6 newcomers to learn the ins and outs of radio/ audio production and storytelling for radio. Each participant produced a segment for airing on Trent Radio which was then made available across podcasting platforms. Their episodes have been streamed over 150 times. Another group of 5 newcomers were engaged in arts-based storytelling using theatre approaches in a six-week program facilitated in partnership with Theatre for Good. Each participant produced a video story utilising the techniques taught to them.

The NEW CANADIANS CENTRE YOUNG LEADERS (NCCYL) is a youth leadership council that seeks to empower youth with newcomer experience. It is a platform where youth can discuss the issues that affect newcomer youth, explore their own stories, and build leadership skills. Each cohort runs activities and events to engage newcomer youth and build a collaborative project. The 2021/22 cohort, comprising 7 youth created the NCCYL Show, a radio and podcast show. Each episode covers different topics from a newcomer youth perspective and is recorded, produced, and promoted by the young leaders themselves. The episodes have been streamed on Trent Radio and are available on podcasting platforms.

The **NEWCOMER LEADERSHIP GROUP** is a multi-week leadership training program that supports newcomers in developing their capacity and confidence to engage in the community. The group seeks to provide support to newcomers looking to engage as volunteers and participate in decision-making processes and to expand the capacity for community organisations to include and integrate diverse perspectives in their practice. **Two groups comprising 21 newcomers** were offered in partnership with Arising Collective, with participants being matched to local organisations for volunteer and speaking opportunities following the program.
